
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The Editorial

An MUN Conference has its own set of rules and regulations which are to be followed during the sessions. It has many committees, to name a few: CCPCJ, SC, UNDP, UNEP, DISEC, HRC, GA-I and GA-II. The toughest job in an MUN is to prove your point and get your country recognised.

Other than the time spent in the sessions the most exhausting is the research work involved as there's absolutely no limit for the same. The more you research, the more you excel.

There are different points that are raised in middle of the sessions, like The Point of Order, The point of Personal Privilege, Point Of Information, Point of Parliamentary Enquiry, Moderated Caucuses, unmoderated Caucuses and Voting.

All the delegates are expected to draft a resolution with help of their allies at the end of the conference so as to come to a proper solution. Sometimes, in middle of a conference, there is a crisis situation too, and from my point of view, Crisis Situation is the most interesting part of an MUN. VHSMUN taught me things which were totally unknown to me. I would like to thank my mentors for providing me with such a great opportunity.



During my 2 month stay in France, due to the long weekends, habitual free time and the most generous host family, I was able to pick up a long lost hobby: Art. Both of my host parents were teachers of art. Contemporary art was their passion. So they taught me how to bind a book and I made my own journal! Then they taught me something more complicated the art of "Lidography".

I also learnt Lithography which origins from the medieval period when the drawing was graved on the stone. So, I used the paper to make the comic aside, I also had the pleasure to do ice-skating, biking and going to the circus school and learning the unicycle and trapeze.

I even went to a junior school to give a presentation on India to show our country in its richest form.

This was all possible because of my host mother. She always said -"C'estvraimentbien de boujertoujours par contre de faire rien!!- Its always better to keep moving rather than doing nothing. 
